
People in India are living longer



India had 98 million elderly citizens in 2011 and overall life expectancy is on the rise







India will have ~ 118 million senior citizens by 2016 as average life expectancy will cross 70 years by then




Penetration of India's senior population is also increasing



Gender split amongst high-net worth seniors















- ▶ India had 98 million elderly citizens in 2011 & will have ~ 118 million senior citizens by 2016 as average life expectancy will cross 70 years
- → 1 out of every 3 seniors lives alone
- Seniors living alone enjoy their independence and are well connected by remote means, but they find daily routine activities physically exhausting ...
- More younger seniors show dislike for having to do cooking, doing the dishes, car service, household repairs, driving etc on their own
- Family systems are not taking care of seniors 24/7
- >> Most seniors want to move out of town into a property of their own
- Seniors seek a premium living space
- >> Thus, there is a well-developed need for senior living homes in India
- ► For 43% seniors in metro and 31% seniors in non metro, lifestyle is the strongest motivator for seniors to seek senior living homes
- → ~ 1580 seniors per metro plan to buy & move to a senior living home in future







80% seniors are concerned about following crimes:

Break-in

- Growing life attacks on senior citizens
- Incidents of gaining entry with fake identity & killing

Stealing

- Untrustworthy servants and errand-runners
- Aid in stealing cash, jewelry, durables and other valuables

Vehicle theft

Car stereos and motorcycles are most commonly prone to theft

Reporting Incidence 35.5%

Seniors display very high fear about these incidents, highest fear is around "break-ins"



Security concerns also cause fear for safety and damage one's sense of freedom

Lack of assurance on security thus takes an emotional toll too







Security is the foremost concern for senior citizens

There is thus a well-developed need for secure assisted living homes for seniors in India

The Solution: A secure assisted living home with following characteristics -

24x7 Security with combination of ESS & traditional security measures

Access to care workers who assist in day-to-day activities

Maintenance, housekeeping, travel needs & social needs taken care of by someone reliable Care units at assisted living homes can execute these activities & function as secure living homes for seniors

- Bathing Sponge bath, tub bath or shower: Receives no assistance or assistance in bathing only 1 part of body
- Dressing Gets clothes and dresses without any assistance except for tying shoes
- Toileting Goes to toilet room, uses toilet, arranges clothes & returns without any assistance (may use cane or walker for support and may use bedpan/urinal at night






Importance and consideration of holistic living increases with age











Income split (%)





But usually, nobody is around to take care of senior **patients** ...



Senior caretaking is usually not feasible in many families ... key reasons being ...

Unavailability of children

Busy work life of children

"Patients with cognitive decline whose children stay abroad or who has lost his/her spouse do not have anybody to take care"

"I know few people who are in US, Singapore they want knee replacement but they said it will be very difficult because there is nobody to take care of them"

"Families are becoming nuclear now. If there is an elder in the family requiring 24 hour care you cannot do it as both the husband and wife are working"

"They usually don't have immediate attendant or relatives who have enough time to look after them"
















